Project-Based Learning Assignment: Introduction to Sociology 3100

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Introduction

The **two-part assignment** provides you with the opportunity to relate real life matters to the ideas and techniques discussed in the classroom lectures. The assignment is designed to follow the tasks required of skilled sociologists as closely as possible. The assignment asks you to examine social problems from a sociological perspective and suggest policies for modifying the negative aspects of social problems. It is expected that, throughout this assignment, you will learn to evaluate, gather understanding and recognize social problems from a broad perspective.

The project is broken down in to 2 parts. You may earn up to 20 points (20% of total grade) of credit for each part (40% of total grade).

Project Part 1

- Please select a topic covering a social subject (think sociologically! You are free to select your own topic) from chapters 3 to 11 from the textbook, which you are interested in exploring further (start early in the semester). The topic has to address concerns related to sociology. Be specific when selecting your topic (e.g. online education pros/cons for community college students or social media aspects in education).
- 2. Form groups (up to **4** people in a group). Start early in the semester.
- Select at least TWO articles from the popular press (web, magazines, and newspapers) and at least TWO articles from a social science journal (See KCC library's website: <u>http://kbcc.cuny.libguides.com/az.php</u>). These articles should be ones not included in the course materials.

Research will be presented in class and submitted in writing (you will email me as an attachment your paper. No hard copies will be collected).

4. Directions for Part 1 of the Assignment:

- Write a brief review of each of the four articles.
- Provide full citations to the articles.
- The paper should be 4-5 pages in length.
- Select one of the sociological perspectives: functionalism, conflict theory, symbolic interactionism.
- Interpret the social problem from the selected sociological perspective. Furthermore, be specific in your explanation: what you learned from each reading and which sociological perspective you are using.
- Suggest a social policy to improve the social problem
- During the presentation (15-20 minutes), the student will not read from the paper, rather he/she should summarize key issues and be ready to lead a discussion on the topic.
- 5. <u>Due Date</u>: Presentation dates will be announced. Your group will be committed to completing the presentation on that date.

6. Suggestions for Organizing the Written Assignment:

• Start with an introductory paragraph that outlines and describes your social topic, such as why it is important.

- Summarize the information provided for each article in a paragraph (4 articles). It will be interesting if you can find opposite views on the topic you selected.
- Write a couple of paragraphs to explain the social topic from a sociological perspective.
- Recommend social policy to improve or lessen the negative concerns of your social problem in 2-3 paragraphs.
- End with a conclusive paragraph summarizing your research.
- BE CAREFUL TO AVOID PLAGIARISM.

Project Part 2

For this part 2, students may earn up to 20 points of credit by developing a **Video Presentation** or an **infographic** of the topic you selected in **part one**. The video or infographic has to be uploaded on http://www.youtube.com/ (or any other server) and the link to the presentation has to be posted on the class's blog (part of the class website).

<u>Due Date</u>: **Tues. May 31, 2016** is the last date to submit the URL (link) to your video or infograph. Your group will be committed to completing the presentation on that date.

Your video or infographic should demonstrate the following:

- The key aspects of your topic
- 4 An authentic application of your topic
- 4 A strong research base for your topic
- Sharing insight you gained from having read related material
- Lxpanding the topic by validating an idea with your own experience
- 4 An organized presentation that follows good visual design principles
- Your short video (a five- to six-minute) may focus on *any* aspect of sociology that you find timely and interesting.
- **For the infographic:** highlights statistics that will seize people's attention
- Tell the basic story of your topic
- Present visual data narratively
- 4 Use color in a meaningful way
